AUZ-Sensei Walking Map

Time required from/to litaka-Eki★sign] (approximate walking time)

- ① **Kushida River Course (green):**
about 1.8 km - about 40 min.
- ② **Mezurashi Pass Course (blue):**
about 4.3 km - about 85 min.
- ③ **Ako Course (pink):**
about 6.7 km - about 135 min.

"Auz-Sensei", which was written by Hideki Kojima, vividly describes the year that Yasujiro Ozu spent as a substitute teacher at Miyamae Ordinary Elementary School (currently Matsusaka City litaka Senior Citizen Welfare Center) at the age of 19, before he joined Shochiku Kinema. Wasn't it during his time as a substitute teacher that the original landscape of Ozu's films, which are Japan's pride to the world?!

A Miyamae Ordinary Elementary School Site

The site of the elementary school where Ozu worked as a substitute teacher for one year. There is "Yasujiro Ozu Archive", where many of his memorabilia are on display.



"Keibo-no-Hi", the monument of admiration on the site, was erected to reflect Mt. Tsubonegatake, which Ozu climbed in clogs.

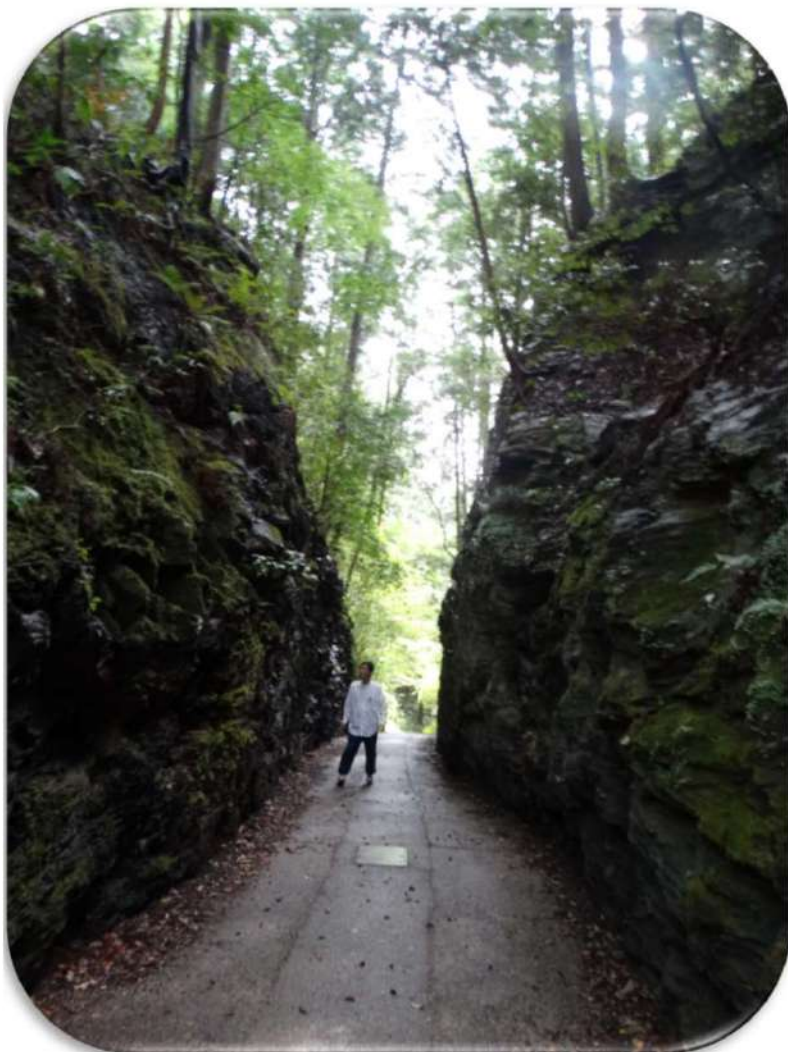


A summer greetingcard to a student from his teaching days is inscribed on the monument.

B Hanaoka Shrine

A shrine that was a popular playground for children. The neighborhood would flourish as an inn town on the Wakayama-Kaido ancient roadway.

It was close to the elementary school and Ozu often visited it on walks.



There is also a small Jizo (guardian deity) on the pass!



C Mezurashi-Pass

A pass that used to be a route for children living in Ako area to go to school. It is also the place where Genta and Tetsuo encountered a Tengu (a long nosed goblin) when they had a duel.

The large rock at the cut-through is worth seeing and Amaterasu Oomikami (the God of the Sun) and Amanokoyane-no-Mikoto (the God that appeared in Japanese mythology) are said to have met here.

D Kushida River

Ozu often enjoyed fishing in this clear stream that flows along Miyamae village. It is also a memorable place where children searched for kappa (water imp) based on Ozu's stories.



E Mizuya Shrine

A shrine that used to be a playground for children living in the Ako area. Sadakichi and his friends enjoyed the Mochi-Maki (rice cake scattering) ceremony at the shrine, after escaping from school.



F Ako Branch School Site

This is the site of the branch school where the children of the Ako area studied until the 4th grade.



Currently, only the gate remains.
