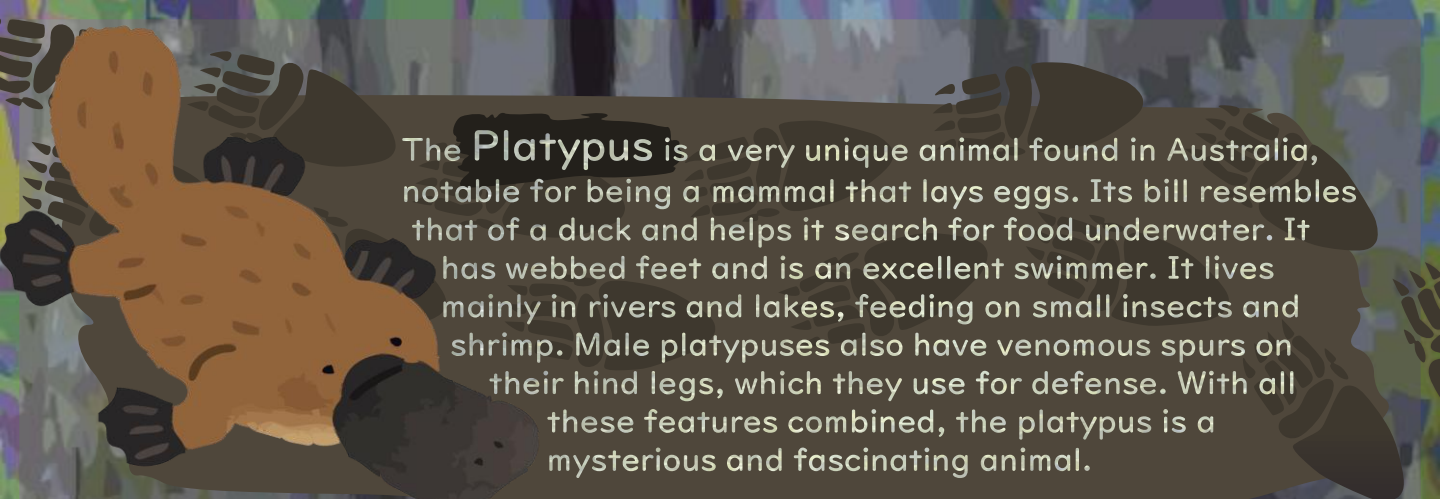


Koalas are marsupials that live in Australia and are known for their cute appearance, with round ears and large noses. They mainly feed on eucalyptus leaves and obtain most of their moisture from them, so they rarely need to drink water. They spend most of their time in trees and can sleep for up to 20 hours a day, leading a very relaxed lifestyle. They are also known to have sharp claws which they use to grip trees firmly and move around slowly and carefully. Although koalas may appear gentle, they are actually quite territorial and may fight with others that come too close to them. Their calls are also surprisingly loud and have a deep tone.

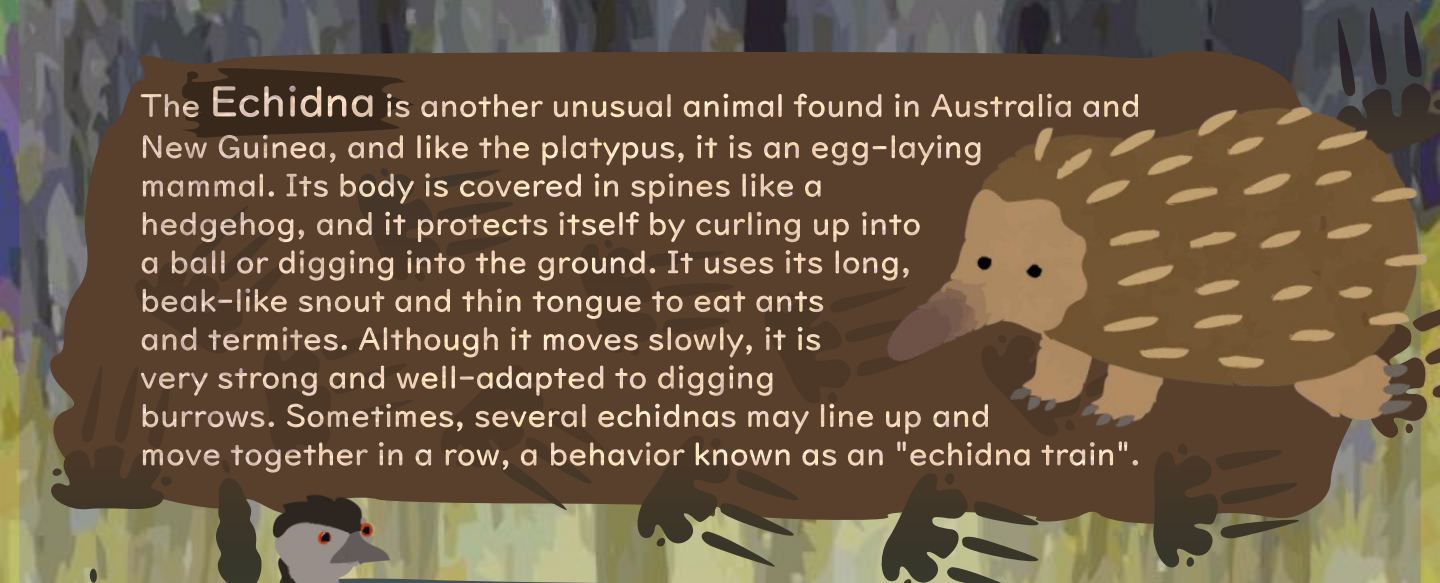
Kangaroos are an iconic animal of Australia, known for moving around by jumping with their powerful legs. Their long tails are used for balance. They raise their young in a pouch, where newborn babies grow for about six months. Kangaroos can often be seen in the wild and live in a variety of environments such as grasslands and forests. There is said to be about twice as many kangaroos as people in Australia, making them a familiar presence to Australians.



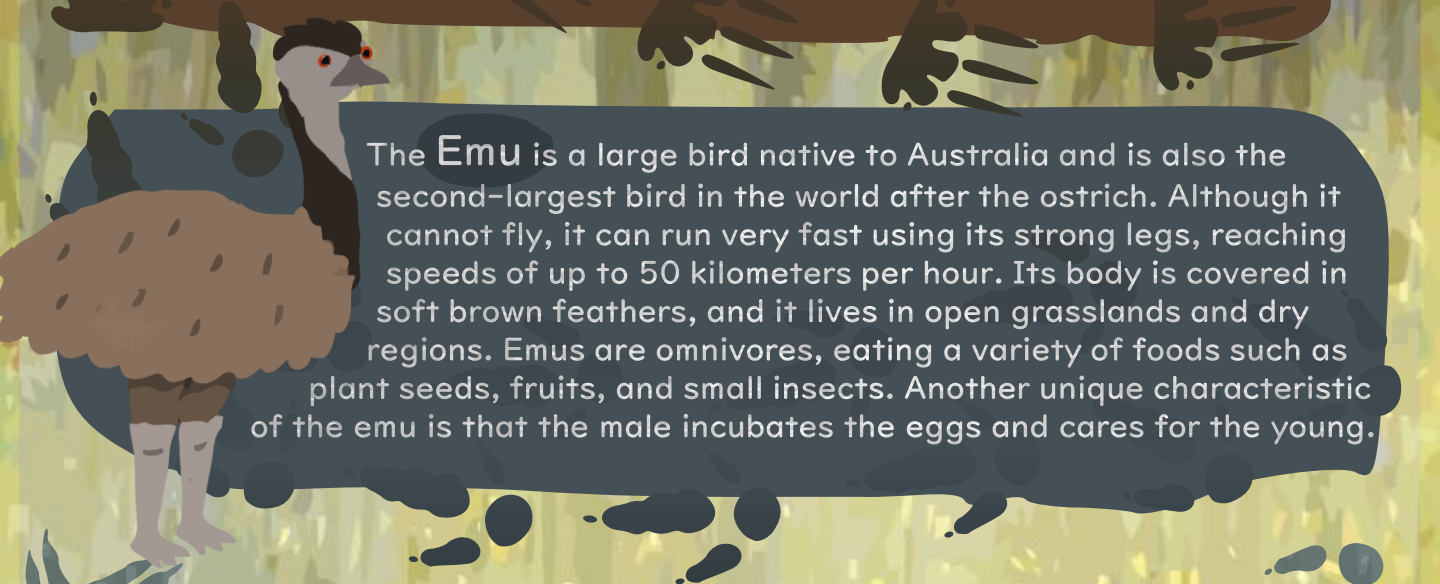
The **Tasmanian Devil** is a carnivorous marsupial that lives on the island of Tasmania. Despite its small size, it is a very powerful animal. It has black fur, sharp teeth, and a strong jaw capable of crushing bones. True to its name, it is called a "devil" because it makes loud noises and moves aggressively when angry. It is mainly nocturnal and plays an important role as a scavenger by feeding on dead animals. Today, its population is decreasing due to disease and environmental changes, so conservation efforts are being made to protect them.



The **Platypus** is a very unique animal found in Australia, notable for being a mammal that lays eggs. Its bill resembles that of a duck and helps it search for food underwater. It has webbed feet and is an excellent swimmer. It lives mainly in rivers and lakes, feeding on small insects and shrimp. Male platypuses also have venomous spurs on their hind legs, which they use for defense. With all these features combined, the platypus is a mysterious and fascinating animal.



The **Echidna** is another unusual animal found in Australia and New Guinea, and like the platypus, it is an egg-laying mammal. Its body is covered in spines like a hedgehog, and it protects itself by curling up into a ball or digging into the ground. It uses its long, beak-like snout and thin tongue to eat ants and termites. Although it moves slowly, it is very strong and well-adapted to digging burrows. Sometimes, several echidnas may line up and move together in a row, a behavior known as an "echidna train".



The **Emu** is a large bird native to Australia and is also the second-largest bird in the world after the ostrich. Although it cannot fly, it can run very fast using its strong legs, reaching speeds of up to 50 kilometers per hour. Its body is covered in soft brown feathers, and it lives in open grasslands and dry regions. Emus are omnivores, eating a variety of foods such as plant seeds, fruits, and small insects. Another unique characteristic of the emu is that the male incubates the eggs and cares for the young.

Australia is home to many distinctive animals that are rarely seen in other countries. If you ever have the chance, be sure to visit Australia and experience its wildlife for yourself.
